

Annual Report Summary: Southeast Region (GA, SC, FL)

Professional associations: GA's is fairly active (the GCA met twice); SC has no unifying classical association, and the State's number of CAMWS members is fairly low; the Classical Association of Florida (CAF), consisting primarily of K-12 teachers, met twice.

Promotional activities: All three states' promotional activities were largely those linked with each state's JCL chapter: numbers at the Fall Forum and Spring Convention for GA were excellent, and respectable for SC. FL had around 1000 students attend its Spring Convention and has added a Fall Forum to the calendar. GJCL's praetorian program, focused on leadership, is an innovative way to involve students whose interests lie outside the traditional Classics curriculum. (I look forward to discussing this further with Amy Leonard at CAMWS 2018.) The College of Charleston hosted the SCJCL Fall Forum, bringing together high school and university faculty and also involving faculty from USC. The effort is part of an initiative to have the state's three university classics programs host the Fall Forum on a rotating basis. FSU's undergraduates hosted a *certamen* style event that brought together university and college students from neighboring schools.

Grant proposals: both SC and GA had successful CPL grant proposals. There was one unsuccessful applicant from SC for the Bernario award.
